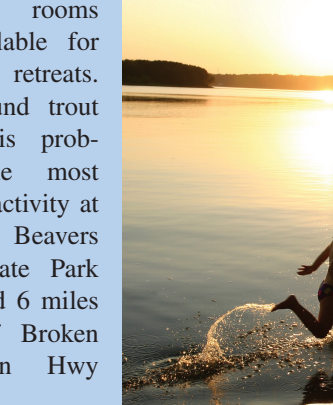

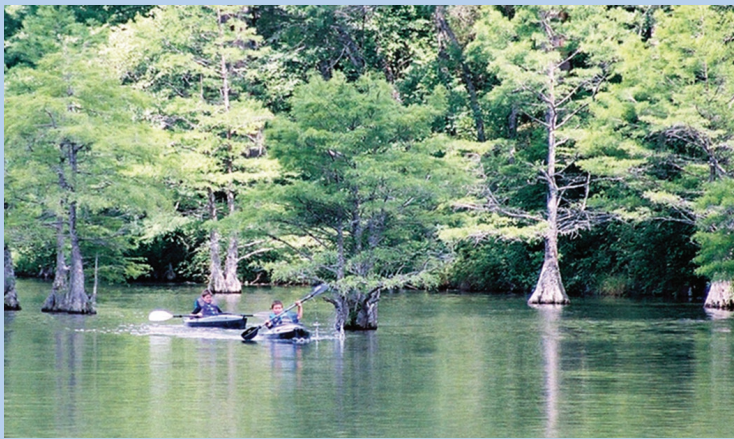

Beavers Bend Resort Park includes the Forest Heritage Center Museum, the Nature Center, Riding Stables and the Train Depot, the Lakeview Lodge, marina, restaurant, an amphitheater, and Cedar Creek Golf Course. Kids love Beavers Bend because there is so much for them to do! There is fishing, hiking, playgrounds, paddle boats, miniature golf, canoe rentals and float trips, a swim beach, snow cones, and much more. Beavers Bend State Park has the Lakeview Lodge, cabins, RV and tent camping and group camping. Meeting rooms are available for corporate retreats. Year round trout fishing is probably the most popular activity at the park. Beavers Bend State Park is located 6 miles north of Broken Bow on Hwy 259A.



Next to Beavers Bend Resort Park is Broken Bow Lake. Broken Bow Lake is known as one of Oklahoma's most beautiful lakes and is a great place for boating and all types of water sports. Over 14,000 acres of pristine deep water that is clear and cool year round make it perfect for skiing, wake boarding, swimming, and fishing. Broken Bow Lake has 180 miles of shoreline that make camping, picnics, hiking, and bird watching also popular past times. Broken Bow Lake

Pine Creek Lake is set in the forested Kiamichi Mountains and features a series of long, deep coves projecting from the main body of the lake. Fishermen love this lake for the crappie, white bass, large mouth bass, and channel catfish.

Mountain Fork Park is probably Oklahoma's most consistently flowing and best white water areas that our state offers. Fisherman, kayak, and canoe enthusiasts enjoy this park with its rock gardens, rapids,

Red Slough Wetlands Preserve covers 7,800 acres and is located 6 miles south of Haworth. The Red Slough is a popular place for bird watchers and duck hunters. More than 260 bird species, 313 plant species, 47 snake and lizard species, hundreds of insect species, and many other animals call the Red Slough home.
